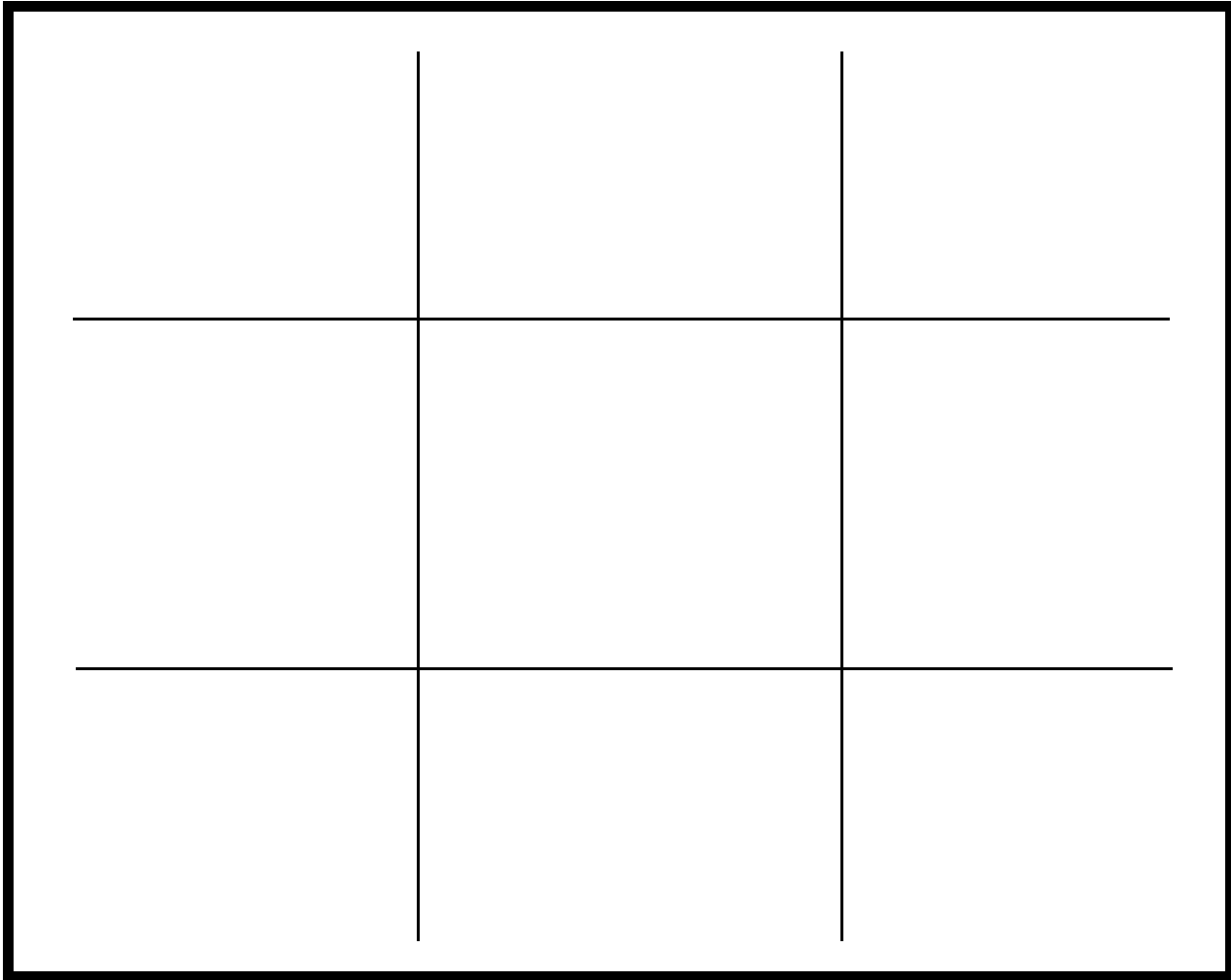

CHAPTER 9 — The Pacific Northwest

Cities: Lewiston, Great Falls, Helena, Missoula, and Kalispell, Montana; Coeur d'Alene, Lewiston, Sandpoint, Grangeville, Boise, Twin Falls, and Pocatello, Idaho; Jackson, Wyoming; La Grande, Pendleton, The Dalles, and Portland, Oregon; Astoria, Spokane, Walla Walla, Vancouver, Longview, Wenatchee, Yakima, Seattle, Tacoma, Olympia, Richland, and Kennewick, Washington

Features: South Pass Rocky Mountains, Bear Lake Idaho, Green River, Teton Pass

The routes traveled by early Northwest explorers remain important today. Pioneers and settlers followed the early explorers and recognized the bountiful resources noted in diaries and journals. They built towns, many of which grew into cities with names that recognize those Americans who risked all they had to chart new land: Thompson Falls Montana, Lewiston Idaho, Clarkston Washington. The Indian trails and treacherous waterways of the early day were first replaced by dirt roads and railroads that served to connect the developed east with the bountiful west. Highways and Interstates with routes that closely follow the original pioneer trails do the same today.
